In December 2011, FEMA released the Crosswalk of Target Capabilities to Core Capabilities, which aligns all 37 target capabilities from the Target Capabilities List (TCL) to individual core capabilities. The document is intended to support the transition that states, localities, tribes, and territories face in realigning activities organized by the TCL to the new core capabilities. This activity is part of the 2011 State Preparedness Report effort.

Featured Topic for January/February

On February 5, 2012, thousands of football fans from around the world will convene in Indianapolis, Indiana, to attend or participate in Super Bowl XLVI activities. Events such as political rallies, protests, and concerts present unique challenges for special events planners. These events require coordinated intelligence and information sharing among emergency management and response agencies from



Federal, State, and local governments as well as private sector entities. Intelligence and information sharing are key components to homeland security and intelligence experts need access to timely, accurate, and relevant information from a variety of different sources in order to effectively deter and mitigate potential threats.

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) will designate events, such as the Super Bowl, as a Level I Special event. This level of classification provides the resources for jurisdictions to plan for and effectively manage large-scale special events. In order to help these jurisdictions prepare for these events, LLIS.gov provides members with an Intelligence and Information Sharing topic-specific page. This page includes a variety of reports in addition to LLIS.gov exclusive

LLIS.gov Tutorial

LLIS.gov provides members with several different ways to submit after-action reports, lessons learned, and other emergency management documents to the system. Members can use the Submit to *LLIS.gov* tab on the homepage, the After-Action Resource Center in the New *LLIS.gov* tab, and topic-specific pages to submit documents to the system. To submit documents to *LLIS.gov*, please follow the steps below.



- 1. Log into LLIS.gov.
- 2. In the Submit to *LLIS.gov* tab on the homepage, click on the appropriate document type under 'Submit Content'.
- 3. Complete all required fields, in red, and additional fields such as the document Author, Publisher, Publisher URL, and brief document abstract.
- 4. Review and verify all the information is correct.
- 5. Click "Submit," and the system will confirm this submission.

Joplin, Missouri, Tornado

 The Response to the 2011 Joplin, Missouri, Tornado Lessons Learned Study

On Sunday, May 22, 2011, a catastrophic Enhanced Fujita-5 (EF-5) tornado struck the City of Joplin, Jasper County, and Newton County in southwest Missouri in the late afternoon. With winds in excess of 200

miles per hour (mph), the ¾-mile-wide tornado cut a 6-mile path of destruction through central Joplin. The tornado caused 161 fatalities and approximately 1,371 injuries as of May 27, 2011, making it the single deadliest U.S. tornado since 1947. Thousands of structures were destroyed or damaged, from single family homes to apartment buildings to large retail and public buildings, including St. John's Regional Medical Center, the Home Depot, and Wal-Mart. This report includes preliminary findings related to the Federal and local emergency response to the incident. All findings are based upon in-person interviews and analyzed data.

 disseminate information to the public after Hurricane Irene. Nixle allowed
 personnel to reach residents through text messaging, email, and social
 media platforms simultaneously.
- Emergency Public Information and Warnings: Use of Rural Residents' Flood Information and Knowledge by Emergency Responders During the Queensland, Australia, 2011 Floods Emergency responders in several rural communities in Queensland, Australia, received information from upstream residents about the large volume of water flowing down local water systems prior to the 2011 flood inundations. Responders used these residents' experiences and knowledge of the local environment to alert and, when necessary, evacuate populations at risk before the floods.
