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## Did You Know?

On February 24, 2010, the [Centers for Disease Control and Prevention \(CDC\)](#), [Advisory Committee on Immunizations Practices](#), voted to expand the recommendation for annual influenza vaccinations. Since this vote, the CDC has encouraged annual flu vaccinations for everyone 6 months and older. Jurisdictions should ensure that they have resources in place to support this recommendation.

## Influenza

### Featured Topic for November

Influenza season occurs from November through March and peaks in February. Influenza can affect anyone; however, there are higher risks for individuals with underlying conditions, small children, and the elderly. The most effective way to prevent contracting the flu is to receive an immunization shot as soon as they become available.



Jurisdictions across the country need to be prepared for the upcoming flu season. To help emergency planners and public health professionals plan for the upcoming season, *LLIS.gov* offers a [Seasonal Influenza](#) topic-specific page. This page provides *LLIS.gov* users with a library of exclusive documents and user-submitted materials related to all aspects of influenza planning. These documents can assist all public health professionals in refining their existing plans and processes. 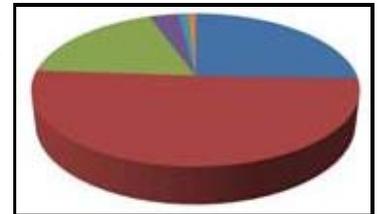

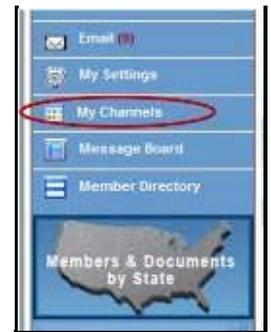


## Accessing Channels on *LLIS.gov*

### *LLIS.gov* Tutorial

Channels are distinct areas of *LLIS.gov* where specific communities, working groups, or teams can directly collaborate. *LLIS.gov* members can establish private Channels for specific groups in order to collaborate within a secure environment. Each Channel features collaboration tools, a document uploading tool, and links to member forums that only the Channel members can access. Public Channels are available to all *LLIS.gov* members, who may subscribe to them by following the steps below.

1. Log into [LLIS.gov](#).



2. Click '[My Channels](#)' in the left navigation menu. Here you will find a list of all the Channels you are currently subscribed to.
3. Select '[Click here to manage your Channel subscriptions.](#)' On the next page, you will find one box listing public Channels that are available to you and another box listing Channels you are already subscribed to.
4. To subscribe to a public Channel, click on the Channel name in the 'My Available Channels' box, which will highlight the item, and click the 'Subscribe' button. To subscribe to more than one public Channel at a time, click on one Channel name while holding down the 'Ctrl' key on the keyboard. Select additional Channel names and click the 'Subscribe' button.
5. To unsubscribe from a public or private Channel, click on the Channel name from the 'My Subscribed Channels' box, which will highlight the item, and click the 'Unsubscribe' button. To unsubscribe from more than one Channel at a time, use the 'Ctrl' key as explained in the previous step. Please note that if you unsubscribe from a private Channel, you will not be able to join it again without sending a request to the Channel administrator.

Exercise and incident after action reports indicate that the use of common terminology and plain language often needs to be reinforced through training and other measures.
- [Emergency Public Information: Assigning Dedicated Writers to Emergency Operations Centers During Activations](#) (*Port of Long Beach and City of Carlsbad, California, Emergency Public Information*)

*Exercises 2010 and 2011))*

Public information officers (PIOs) should consider assigning a dedicated writer to the lead PIO in the emergency operations center (EOC) during activations to support PIO operations. This can help free PIOs from having to capture all the briefing content, allowing them to focus on developing the communications strategy for the incidents.

- [Emergency Public Information: Including Web Site Links in Short Message System and Twitter Messages](#) (*Queensland, Australia, Floods, 2011*)

Public information officers (PIOs) should include direct links to Web sites in emergency alert messages disseminated via Short Message System (SMS), Twitter, and other communications tools that limit the number of characters. This can help ensure that recipients of these alert messages can quickly access additional official information about the emergency.
